Screen time and children: How to guide your child Part 3

Last few newsletters talked about the problems with screens. Too much screen time or regular exposure to poor quality programming has been linked to **obesity**, **sleep problems**, **delays in language and social skill development**, **attention problems**, **behaviour problems** and **violence**.

Here are a few more tips for *how* to guide children's screen time.

Remember: For young children, limit screen time to under 1 hour a day.

For **older children**, set daily limits such as under 2 hours a day, keep screens out of bedrooms, charge devices outside of bedrooms, and stop all digital activity 1 hour before bedtime.

Encouraging digital literacy

Talk to your child about the situations that could occur if they come across inappropriate content online and the behavior you expect.

Encourage your child to think critically about what they see on their screens. Ask your child to consider:

- Is everything on the internet accurate?
- Do you know how to tell if a website is trustworthy?

Help your child understand that media are made by humans with points of view. Explain that many types of technology collect data to send users ads or to make money.

The Seven Teachings

According to an oral traditional story, the Seven Teachings were given to the Anishinaabe early in their history. When the Seven Grandfathers sent their Messenger to learn about the current state of the Anishinaabe people, they were told that the people were not living in harmony with each other, nor with the rest of creation. I a vision quest, the Messenger found a child worthy of the teachings, and the Seven Grandfathers tutored the child in the "good way of life". Each Grandfather instructed the child with one teaching, which collectively became known as the Seven Teachings.

Eagle represents Love which means to be caring, kind and good to all that is around us. To know love is to find peace.

Buffalo represents **Respect** which is an attitude. To honor and listen to your Elders, parents and teachers.

Sabe represents **Honesty** which means to not cheat, lie or steal. Living your life in an honest way keeps things simple and peaceful.

Bear represents **Courage** which is being brave in the face of life's problems. Never give in, never give up.

Beaver represents **Wisdom** which is gained through experience and knowledge. To have wisdom is to know the difference between right and wrong.

Wolf represents **Humility** which is to live your life free from arrogance, to not be boastful, and to have a modest sense of your own worth. When you humble yourself, you open doors to see things you might have overlooked.

Turtle represents Truth which is to know all things.

Let's us never forget to use these teaching every day for the rest of our lives on Mother Earth.

It includes questions and prompts for capturing the best memories of the school year. Take a look!


I will not be returning to Centennial School for the 2023/2024 school year. It has been my pleasure to be part of this wonderful school.

The NED Show is visiting our school! The assembly is filled with storytelling, humor, illusions and amazing yo-top tricks where our kids learn the hidden message in NED's name:






